Party for Prayers for Jesus



On Thursday Oct 11 St. Mary's HS celebrated our Thanksgiving liturgy in the gym. This year was extra special because a) the choir was fantastic and b) our school was blessed to receive the Pilgrimage cross as it was delivered to us from John Sweeney — and our students walked it to Monsignor Haller after the Liturgy.

Oct 11 was also the feast day for Saint Pope John XXIII; the humble and pastoral priest who was responsible for the Second Vatican council in the '60's as well as coining the phrase: "Throw open the windows of the church and let the fresh air of the spirit blow through".

John XXIII was also known for making any and everyone feel comfortable around him, despite being the leader of 1.2 billion Catholics.

For example, in 1962, American Journalist
Norman Cousins nervously delivered a
message to Pope John XXIII. As Cousins sat in
Pope John's study he recalls how the Pope,
whom he had never met, went out of his way
to put Cousins as ease: "We have very much to
talk about," the Pope said. "Just remember, I
am an ordinary man; I have two eyes, a nose
— a very large nose. . . You must feel
completely relaxed. We will talk man to man."

Fr Toby Collins, CR presided over our Thanksgiving liturgy and he shared that the most impactful experience Saint John XXIII had on the council is we are all equal in the eyes of God. During the homily, Fr Invited up the Principal, Vice- Principal and students to stand in front of the stage, facing out. The priest then removed his Chasuble, his Alb and finally his collar and stood beside the row. He stated he is no more important in the eyes of God than anyone else in the gym.

The impact did not go unnoticed

Throughout the rest of that day and the next I had teachers and students comment on their positive impressions of the liturgy.

One specifically bears worth mentioning.

The day after the liturgy a grade 9 student asked if she could speak with me. Aya is not only new to the school; she is new to the country. Aya moved here recently from Dubai with her parents and she is Muslim.

Aya asked if she could share what she thought about the *Party for Prayers for Jesus.* I didn't understand so I asked her to explain. "you know, when we gathered in the gym yesterday..."

A *Party for Prayers for Jesus.* Now that is a metaphor I've never considered.

Aya had never been in contact with the Catholic faith and was very happy to announce she felt calm and at peace with the experience. She was so happy that she went home to share this with her parents. Her mother told her that Jesus was a good man and she was in a good place being at our school.

I couldn't have been more touched...but there was more. Aya asked what we called that song after the first reading. I explained it was the responsorial psalm. She remembered the repeated words and sang it back to me:

"Lord, I thank you for your faithfulness and love". Hearing those words made her feel safe.

And she thanked me.

...and that is one more reason why I love my ministry as chaplain of St. Mary's HS.

"Ours is a greeting, not of farewell which separates, but of friendship which remains,"

Last year, the SMHS Legacy Committee was established with a mission of transforming the St Mary's campus into a hub of healthy living for both students and the wider community. Early opportunities for improvement included the beautification of gardens & planters, the creation of a community greenhouse, and the planned layout of a walking trail. Long term plans include the pursuit of an eight lane track, turf field, and a multi-use court.

Each year, Aviva Insurance provides community improvement grants of up to \$100 000 to projects around the country that seek to better the lives of individuals by bringing them together. St Mary's entered this year's competition, proposing the multi-use court as a place in which people of different ages, abilities, and interests could come together to engage in a healthy and active lifestyle. The court, replacing the dilapidated tennis facility, will feature cutting edge Matteflex technology that provides a sustainable surface for any number of activities from community gatherings to sports and games such as basketball, ball hockey, tennis, and pickleball. The long term goal would be to provide lights for extended play after dark and create a space for activity in a high-density neighbourhood.



The first round of the competition saw St Mary's come in first from 188 projects with over 21 000 community votes registered online. This placement secured an initial \$15 000 of funds and made the project eligible for the final stage in which a panel of judges reviewed two promotional videos and a series of written responses outlining the projected impact on the community. The judging panel has met and the three winners of \$100 000 grants will be announced on November 20.

St Mary's awaits the results with patient hope, looking forward to the opportunity to continue to make the school not just a place *in the community* but rather a place *for the community*.

The girl's field hockey team had an exceptional season this year. The St. Mary's Eagles were gold medalist at the AC tournament, gold medalist in D8, gold medalist in CWOSSA. This team was the first St. Mary's field hockey team in over 32 years to win a CWOSSA championship and get to represent our school at OFSSA. They represented D8 and CWOSSA well last week at OFSSA finishing first in their pool play, winning a shoot-out in quarter finals, advancing to the semifinals, and then winning St. Mary's first ever field hockey OFSSA medal of antique bronze. To sum up their success this year on the field- they played 21 games with half of these against elite teams at CWOSSA and OFSSA. Our Eagles filled their opponents nets 52 times, and only allowed 6 goals to be scored on them the whole year. (In D8, CWOSSA and tournament play they only allow 2 goals in total, a remarkable stat on its own). Congratulations to the girl's field hockey team on becoming the best and most successful team ever to play at St. Mary's.


